THE BUCKHORN SALOON HISTORY

1881 Seventeen-year-old Albert Friedrich opened the Buckhorn Saloon with the standing offer to all patrons, "if you bring in your deer antlers, you can trade them for a shot of whiskey or a beer."



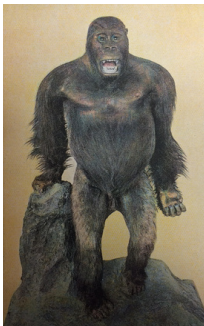
1882 The world record "78 Point Buck" is purchased by Albert for \$100 to be displayed at the Buckhorn. The same 78-point trophy can be seen by all behind our magnificent bar,



1920 Prohibition begins and the Buckhorn discontinues the sale of alcohol. The Buckhorn thrives as a curio store and soda fountain.



1922 The Buckhorn Saloon moves to a larger space on the corner of Houston Street and South Flores Street. Albert acquires a full-size gorilla, which he places in the front window for all to see. This gorilla can be seen on display in our African Hall.



1933 The repeal of prohibition takes place and the Buckhorn begins selling alcohol once again.



1939 World War II begins and San Antonio becomes a training ground for many soldiers who visit the Buckhorn and spread the iconic story.

1956 Lone Star Brewing Company purchased the world-famous collection and re-opens in a new building erected on the Lone Star Brewery grounds. The Buckhorn is now known as the "Hall of Horns".



1996 The Lone Star Brewery closes and the new owner, Stroh Brewing Company, moves the operation to Longview, TX. In order to keep the Buckhorn collection in San Antonio, the granddaughter of Albert Friederich, Mary Friederich Rogers and her husband, Wallace Rogers Jr., purchase the collection.

1998 The Buckhorn reopens on the corner of Houston and Presa, just blocks from it's original 1881 location.

2006 The Buckhorn Saloon and Museum expand once again with the addition of the Texas Ranger Museum
